# First step in developing downtown Suisun

SUISUN CITY - The first
major construction in Old Town Suisun City in several years finally kicked off Friday with the groundbreaking for the muchawaited Harbor Center project.
Work starts Monday on Main Work starts Monday on Main
Street West Partners' first projStreet West Partners' first projcover 38,500 square feet of commercial and retail stores designed around a central courtyard.
Officials Officials promoted Harbor Square as the launching point
for more Old Town develop ment that will soon include a

West West promised there will soon more projects in the offing, alluding to a major project in works but giving no details at his time.
Mayor Jim Spering called he ground-breaking "a very
important day for Suisun City" and the culmination of a massive multimillion dollar rede-
velopment effort that started more than a decade ago with
building City Hall and razing the crime-blighted Crescent neighborhood.
"We wanted to carve a niche that was unique," Spering said
of the city's long-term plans. The effort hit a stumbling block when the city redevelopment efforts weren't followed by private investment, "something we did not calculate
happening," Spering said happening," Spering said.
Suisun City revived its paign last year by hiring Main paign last year by hiring Main
Street West to oversee the Old Town redevelopment efforts and sold it 8.4 acres of land
million. The city had spent the last 15 years spending $\$ 14.2$ million to purchase, clean up and improve these sites that run from
large parcels near One Harbor Center to Crystal School.
Earlier this year, the weetened the pot by selling the acant Crystal School site to Main Street West to build a ousing development.
The city's leaders hope developing these sites with a mix esidential development will finally bring in more commercial development, they said.

Internet registrars, some critics of the Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers have complained about the U.S. oversight role, saying the group sometimes
make decisions that don't reflect the Internet community at large.
